WHO IS BRANDON:

Brandon brings 20 years of combined law enforcement service to the table. A good amount of the time was as a street cop and detective with a municipal police department in the valley. Brandon has worked as a DRE, FTO, SRO, agency training coordinator, range-master and gang officer. With the Lottery he is the department’s Terrorism Liaison Officer Coordinator (TLOC) as well as the department’s Senior Range-master. His prior state service was as a Senior Investigator with the Medical Board of California.

Brandon worked for US DOJ during 2005, living and working on a small fire base in the Red Zone of eastern Baghdad Iraq in support of a US DOD mission. Brandon was a POA board member and President for 9 years. He was one of the key players in contract negotiations, disciplinary representation and in negotiating an enhanced retirement plan as well as PERS health care for the agency and city. Brandon has been recognized by the House, Senate and Congress as American Legion Officer of the Year. He was featured on Court TV for his efforts in solving, by arrest, a 13 year old homicide. The suspect was identified and tracked down to near the Mexico border. He ultimately confessed during the interrogation and was later convicted by a jury. This brought closure to the victim’s orphaned daughter (who was 5 at the time of the murder), the family, and the community.
